What is Lent?

Lent is the 6-week period leading up to Easter.



Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the Lent season. It is a day to remember the serious reality of death and the joyful hope of Christ.

Why Ashes?

Ashes are used as a symbol of repentance from sin and a reminder that we are weak like the dust of the ground.

Why Do We Observe It?

Ashes are ministered to our foreheads in the shape of a cross to remind us of the reality of death. It is a day to pause the normal day to day and think about eternity.

We think we can be in control of our lives and future, that we can somehow escape pain and death. But no one will escape the reality of death despite age, riches, being smart or having a healthy lifestyle.

It is easy to get caught up in idolatry, which is pursing things in place of God. Being liked by your friends or having the newest video game or toy isn't bad, but does it replace your love for God? Trying to be happy or avoid pain is good, but does it take up all your time and energy? When life is good, God gets pushed from our thoughts. But when life gets hard, we often turn quickly to him. Wearing the ashes all day helps us see how much sin grieves God's heart and a desire to turn our hearts back to Him in repentance, obedience, and love.
